Peter is an award winning architect and Vice President of the Ecclesiastical Architects and Surveyors Association. He studied architecture at Liverpool John Moores and Oxford Brookes Universities, graduating with a First and a Merit respectively, before passing his professional examinations in 2010. As a student, Peter developed interests in vernacular architecture, historic building conservation and natural building materials, and how these can be integrated to foster a sense of place. This in turn led to an interest in architectural psychology – the way in which buildings shape and influence how we behave and feel, and the way in which we interact with each other.

Peter developed his expertise in conservation by taking up a position at Nick Cox Architects, where he worked on a variety of projects from nationally important Grade I listed buildings, including Blenheim Palace, Woburn Abbey and Wells Cathedral, to more humble vernacular structures. It was here that Peter developed extensive experience and skills in stone conservation.

In 2015, studying under Richard Harris, Peter gained his MSc in Timber Building Conservation from the Weald and Downland Open Air Museum in conjunction with the University of York, furthering his interests in this form of construction. His dissertation paper focussed on the history and dating of Cathedral and Monastic church roofs. His knowledge of the history and development of timber framing in England and Wales, along with his experience recording timber frames, underpins the practice's extensive expertise in this area.

In 2017, Peter went into partnership with a former colleague to establish Manifest Design Workshop, before moving on to establish Wollaston Rose Architects in 2023, in order to further pursue his love of Building Conservation and Ecclesiastical Architecture.

St. Mary the Virgin, Witney

General fabric repairs to this Grade I listed 12th and 13th century Major Parish Church. Currently working on replacement glazed doors to the Norman north porch, a glazed internal west end porch, and replacement doors to the 'Winchester Room', which forms the parish room.

Sutton Baptist Church, London

Quinquennial Inspection and general advice on the repair and maintenance of this enormous Grade II * listed 1930s Baptist Church complex by the celebrated 20th century Cachemaille-Day. Currently working on amending parapet and drainage details which have been a persistent problem since the church was originally built.

Hook Norton Baptist Church, Oxfordshire

Repair, renovation and reordering of significant Grade II listed Georgian Chapel, home to one of the earliest Baptist congregations in the country. 


Holy Trinity, Woodgreen

Re-roofing and some associated stone repairs to this Grade II listed

19th century church by Bejamen Ferry. Client: The PCC of Witney Parish

West end re-ordering to provide a servery designed to match and integrate with the existing pews, and an external disabled WC building reminiscent of a dovecote to this Grade II listed church of medieval origin. The church sits in a particularly sensitive landscape setting and the churchyard contains the substantial remains of a medieval preaching cross, which is a Scheduled Ancient Monument.

St. George's Garrison Church, Woolwich

National competition winning design for a pair of memorial gates for this ruined Grade II listed Victorian church by Thomas Wyatt. Formerly part of Woolwich Barracks, it is now owned by Heritage of London Trust Operations and open to the public. The design was inspired by the poem in 'Flanders Fields' and incorporates the remembrance flowers of Britain, France and Germany. The gates were unveiled by HRH The Duke of Gloucester in April 2018, at a ceremony attended by representatives from the French and German embassies. The design won the National Heritage Ironwork Group's Best New Design in a Heritage Setting award in 2019.

St. Frideswide's Church, Frilsham (Berkshire)

Repairs to 19th century cast iron railings, shattered by a falling tree and repairs and re-roofing of the porch in terne coated stainless steel, following a lead theft to this Grade II* listed 12th century medieval church, in an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. The repair drawings for the railings are to be included in a forthcoming National Heritage Ironwork Group (NHIG) publication highlighting best practice.

Stonor Park Chapel, Stonor, Oxfordshire

Repair, re-roofing and internal renovations of Grade I listed private Roman Catholic Chapel dating from the 12th century, with a 15th century brick tower (one of the earliest in the country). The project, which was grant funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund and other charitable grants, involved the complete replacement of the roof covering and associated structural repairs, repairs to the stonework of the chapel and brickwork of the tower, and complete replacement of the timber cupola to the tower. Internally, the thermoplastic floor tiles were replaced with a new stone floor designed by Peter, the striking colour scheme by John Piper was renewed, and a new lighting scheme installed.
